Biliary tract disorders are present in over 3% of the RTT population: cholelithiasis in 2% and biliary dyskinesia in a further 1%. 51 In one study, almost half of those identified with biliary tract disorders were aged under 20 years, two-thirds had gallstones, and nearly 90% required cholecystectomy. 53 Therefore, biliary tract disorders should be considered when unexplained general discomfort is



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present.
