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In fact, the Spanish 's' is not lisped at all – it sounds like the English 's'. The so-called 'lisped' letters are 'z', and 'c' when followed by an 'i', or 'e', and 'd' in some instances. In South-American Spanish, the 'z', and 'c', where followed by an 'i' or 'e' are pronounced like the 's' in English.

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Speakers of Rioplatense Spanish pronounce both ll and y as [ ʎ ] or [ ʝ ]. The traditional pronunciation of the digraph ll as [ ʎ ] is preserved in some dialects along the Andes range, especially in inland Peru and the Colombia highlands (Santander), northern Argentina, all Bolivia and Paraguay.
